



 Their tongues can be 21 inches long (longer than most kids' arms) and are dark blue or purple to protect them from sunburn! Giraffes live in African savan with scattered acacia trees a open grasslands in countries Kenya, Tanzania, and South Africa! 	nd
 Giraffes are herbivores who eat up to 75 pounds of leaves daily (that's as heavy as a third-grade student) and can reach leaves 20 feet high! Baby giraffes are 6 feet tall when born (taller than most adults), can walk within an h and fall 6 feet to the ground when born but don't get hur 	·
 Despite their size, giraffes can run up to 35 miles per hour - faster than you can ride a bicycle! Giraffes only need 5-30 minu of sleep in 24 hours and often nap while standing up!
